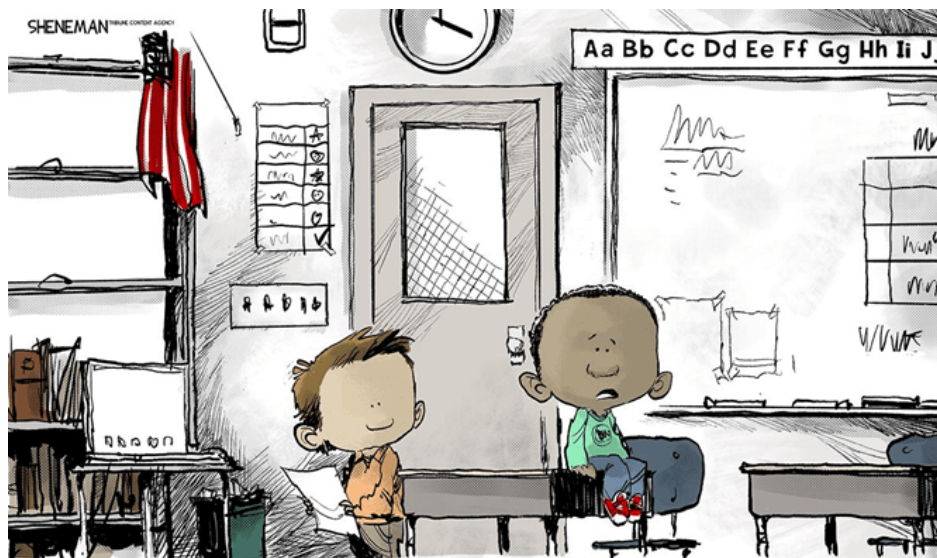
Please Join Us on Saturday, April 18, 8:00 AM!

How many times over the last year have you wondered why Trump and his minions are doing and saying what they are doing and saying? Think of all the lessons we received in church and school that now seem to be lost.

✓ The Golden Rule dates back to 2040 BCE, and is reflected in all major religions: Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Baha’I Faith, Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, Confucianism, Taoism, and even Wicca. It is the bedrock of morality except apparently for Christian Nationalists and tech bros.

✓ Aesop’s fable about the competition between the Wind and the Sun taught us that grace can achieve more than violence; the Tortoise and the Hare taught that fast and flashy doesn’t beat perservience; and *“No act of kindness, no matter how small, is wasted.”*



✓ As far back as 400 BCE Plato and others knew extreme wealth was the death nell for a republic: *“The form of law which I propose would be as follows: In a state which is desirous of being saved from the greatest of all plagues—not faction, but rather distraction—there should exist among the citizens neither extreme poverty nor, again, excessive wealth, for both are productive of great evil.”* Plutarch shared the sentiment: *“An imbalance between rich and poor is the oldest and most fatal ailment of all republics.”* Yet here we are with an obscene oligarchy. For those claiming Christian Nationhood, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr said it best:

“Oh America, how often have you taken necessities from the masses to give luxuries to the classes...God never intended for one group of people to live in superfluous inordinate wealth, while others live in abject deadening poverty.”

✓ Education has been the bedrock for the success of civilizations.



“The mind is not a vessel to be filled, but a fire to be kindled.”

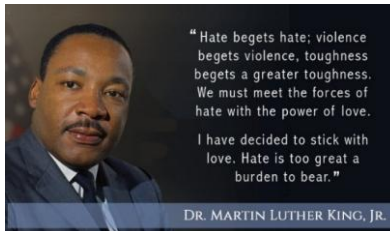

Our Founding Fathers found education essential for the survival of our democracy. The current degradation of public schools is the oligarchy trying to prevent us from gaining the knowledge and tools needed to push back against their greed and corruption. Thomas Jefferson said it best: *“I know no safe depository of the ultimate powers of the society but the people themselves, and if we think them not enlightened enough to*

exercise their control with a wholesome discretion, the remedy is not to take it from them, but to inform their discretion by education. This is the true corrective of abuses of constitutional power.”



✓ After WWII Winston Churchill wisely said: *“Those that fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it.”* The Trump Administration’s attacks on education and Smithsonian Museums are trying to erase our history. The push for only Western history and the attack on DEI also prevents the genius that comes from the combination of ideas that can form a new, complex whole. Instead, they are teaching hate of the “other.” Future progress depends on the lessons from multiple pasts. Our very safety is dependent on understanding the Vietnam and the Iraq wars. Does bombing a theocracy that can produce suicide bombers sound like a wise idea? And we must not forget the toll of the revenge cycles they spawn.



✓ Finally we must not allow the continued attack on science, government agencies, and higher education. The elimination of so many research facilities, government programs and oversight agencies brings to mind what Benjamin Franklin published in his Farmer’s Almanac:



“For the want of a nail the shoe was lost,
For the want of a shoe the horse was lost,
For the want of a horse the rider was lost,
For the want of a rider the battle was lost,
For the want of a battle the kingdom was lost,

And all for the want of a horseshoe-nail.”

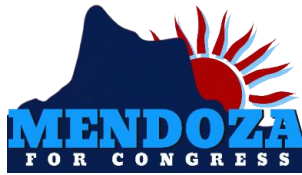

No Kings 3, the largest single-day protest in American history

Arizona: 101,579 protesters took part in 82 events across the state. In Tucson, over 8,000 people took part in the 8-mile Oracle Road demonstration stretching from Wetmore to First.

Nationwide: Between 8 – 9 million protesters participated in 3,300 events in all 50 states along with American Samoa and Puerto Rico. The biggest events took place in NYC, LA, Minneapolis, Chicago, San Francisco, Salt Lake City, Seattle, Ocean Beach San Francisco, Portland, Austin, and St Paul, Minnesota. Virtual protests were available for those with disabilities and those who could not attend.

Worldwide: 22 other countries protested against Trump's administration: Australia, Austria, Canada, Costa Rica, Ecuador, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Kenya, Mexico, Netherlands, Portugal, Santa Lucia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Thailand and the United Kingdom. According to organizers, protests were held on every continent across the globe.

Across the country, millions of people came together to stand up against Trump's authoritarian agenda and say that, in America, we will never bow to a king. Here in Arizona, Keep Arizona Blue Student Coalition helped organize a No Kings rally near Arizona State University where we had important conversations and registered voters.

From the Associated Press:

- **3/4:** A well-connected, privately funded initiative proves how small, low-barrier acts of community outreach are a key to fostering civic engagement among young people.
- **3/4:** At least two retail customers and more than 1,000 companies have filed federal lawsuits to recoup costs from tariffs imposed by Trump without legal authority.
- **3/4:** Gallup poll data shows American sympathies have shifted dramatically toward Palestinians, up from 31% to 41% along with 57% who favor an independent state in the Gaza Strip.
- **3/5:** Some of the sharpest criticism of the Iran war has come from once-loyal MAGA media figures Tucker Carlson, Megyn Kelly and Matt Walsh.
- **3/6:** Elon Musk testified in a shareholder trial for making false and misleading statements that drove down Twitter's stock price before buying the media platform in 2020.
- **3/6:** Federal judge ruled that companies that paid tariffs struck down last month by the Supreme Court are due refunds and ordered customs to stop collecting them.
- **3/6:** National Healthy Start Association has "fatherhood practitioners" at its 116 project sites to support Black fathers, improving infant and maternal mortality rates.
- **3/8:** Minnesota sued the Trump Administration for withholding the \$243 million due the state for Medicaid.
- **3/9:** Federal judge ruled that Kari Lake did not have legal authority to dismantle the Voice of America which has transmitted global news since WWII.
- **3/10:** A group of volunteers have collected and cared for Minneapolis' spontaneous memorials that emerged across the city to preserve and learn from them.
- **3/10:** NASA nudged an asteroid into a slightly different route around the sun, a technique that could help divert a future incoming killer space rock.
- **3/10:** Uber's women-only option went nationwide which matches women drivers and riders to address their safety concerns; Lyft introduced a similar offering in 2024.
- **3/11:** A Quinnipiac poll found 50% of registered voters oppose the US actions against Iran and 75% are concerned about resulting gas and oil prices.
- **3/14:** ROTC students killed a former Army National Guard Member who had spent time in prison for attempting to aid the Islamic State when he opened fire on their classroom at Virginia's Old Dominion University.
- **3/14:** Homeowners filed a class action lawsuit against Rocket Mortgage for colluding with real estate agents to pressure homebuyers into bad loans.
- **3/15:** After a 7-year legal fight, Harvard University turned over 1,850 photos of enslaved people to the International African American Museum in Charleston where half of all slaves first came to the US.
- **3/15:** Indivisible Philadelphia members protested outside a Citizens Bank, one of the largest commercial-banking networks in the US for funding private prisons used to detain ICE deportees.
- **3/16:** Iran war has knocked Trump on his heels in response to American deaths, surging oil prices and dropping financial markets. Even his supporters are questioning his actions as his overall poll numbers are declining.
- **3/16:** Global leaders are counting on skyrocketing costs of gas to appeal to people's selfishness and nationalism to act in their own self-interest to save the planet from climate change.

- **3/17:** Eight secretaries of state in Democratic-led states are taking actions to protect their polling places from ICE agents and their election records during this year's mid-term elections.
- **3/18:** A group of Apache women made a last-ditch appeal to the US Supreme Court to intervene in the transfer of federal forest land in Arizona to international companies that mine copper.
- **3/20:** EU leaders are refusing to join the US and Israel military campaigns in the Middle East; European Commission told leaders there's a mix of financial instruments nations can use to lower energy prices.
- **3/21:** Three Tennessee teens filed a class action suit against Elon Musk's xAI imaging-generation tools that are being used to morph real photos into explicit sexual images of thousands of minors.
- **3/22:** Federal judge blocked federal health officials from cutting the number of vaccines recommended for every child saying RFK Jr. violated federal procedures by revising the vaccine advisory committee.
- **3/24:** A coalition of 17 states is suing Trump over a new federal requirement that would force colleges to report data on student race, gender, test scores and financial aid.
- **3/24:** A former star employee is suing social media giant Meta for age discrimination following his firing at the age of 54 which was part of a purge of employees 40 and older in February 2025.
- **3/25:** After 12 years as CEO of Ms foundation, the first national philanthropy run by women for women she stated feminism has preserved our democracy and constitutional rights and is still alive and well.
- **3/26:** CEO of Anthropic AI intelligence powerhouse in his negotiations with the military has demanded guardrails on how its technology is used; other tech leaders are backing him in his legal fight.
- **3/27:** Los Angeles jury found Meta and YouTube liable for deliberately addicting and harming children.
- **3/27:** A jury in New Mexico found Meta guilty of knowingly harming children's mental health and concealing what it knew about child sexual exploitation on its platforms.
- **3/27:** AP poll shows 59% of Americans say the war with Iran has gone too far; 66% disapprove of Trump's foreign policy; 75% of Republicans and 67% of Democrats dislike high oil and gas prices.
- **3/28:** US Senate approved funding for much of Homeland Security including FEMA, the Coast Guard and TSA, but did not approve funding for ICE.
- **3/28:** OpenAI shut down its social media app Sora after advocacy groups, an actors' union and family estates opposed its outlandish creations of false images of public figures, including MLK Jr and Mr. Rogers.
- **3/29:** Minnesota officials sued Trump for access to evidence they need to independently investigate three shootings by ICE agents, including the killings of Renee Good and Alex Pretti.
- **3/29:** Activist organization Indivisible spearheaded more than 3,000 planned No Kings demonstrations with more than 9 million protesters expected to turn out, making it the largest in US history.
- **3/30:** Helmsley Charitable Trust has spent more than \$850 million on rural health care since 2009 to support telemedicine's psychiatric, cardiac, and cancer care.
- **3/30:** Experts say prolonged high gas prices could spike EV interest and sales since increases in electric costs are far less volatile than gas.
- **3/31:** As he prayed for Christians in the Middle East on Palm Sunday, Pope Leo XIV said that God doesn't listen to the prayers of those who make war or cite God to justify their violence.
- **4/3:** According to a Yale School of Management professor, Trump's mixed messages and false reassurances have led to diminished credibility in financial markets, diminished public confidence and soaring uncertainty.
- **4/5:** Citing the First Amendment, a federal judge permanently blocked Trump from ending federal funding for NPR and PBS.

- **3/4:** Tempe City Council unanimously approved the state's first ordinance to prevent drink-spiking in bars and restaurants which requires them to carry spiking tests kits
- **3/5:** Audit found that over 20% of vendor purchases made with ESA voucher money are barred under the program's guidelines, including one \$7,500 video gaming system.
- **3/8:** Family of ICE detainee demanded an investigation into his death from an untreated tooth infection; four US lawmakers also called for one, including Adelita Grijalva.
- **3/8:** Superior Court judge gave the state 8 months to fix an unconstitutionally flawed system that has not been maintaining public schools, saying proper equipment and well-kept buildings are minimal needs for learning.
- **3/8:** Governor Hobbs vetoed legislation to create a special license plate honoring Charlie Kirk that would insert politics into a nonpartisan governmental function.
- **3/9:** Tucson is one of five cities chosen to participate in an initiative to expand and strengthen community-based strategies proven to prevent violence, support victims, survivors and those most at-risk of experiencing harm.
- **3/9:** Tucson City Council and the Board of Supervisors met to discuss ways the two governments can improve community safety and address homelessness.
- **3/12:** Rep. Adelita Grijalva and Pima County Board Chair Jen Allen along with dozens of people joined together in their opposition to an ICE detention center in Marana.
- **3/13:** Anti-Defamation League's 2026 report gave UA a B grade of "Better than Most" for its actions to combat antisemitism and its Jewish quality of life on campus.
- **3/15:** Governor Hobbs vetoed 3 bills that would limit any efforts to block solar radiation, take money away from a consumer fraud fund in the AGs' office and impose restrictions on initiative petition circulators.
- **3/16:** A panel at the Tucson Festival of Books shared a call to fight against secrecy and information blockades regarding public documents and records.
- **3/18:** Governor Hobbs addressed members of the US Chamber of Commerce arguing for more CAP water due to Arizona's conservation efforts and ability to advance national priorities regarding technology and defense.
- **3/18:** AG Mayes filed suit against Kalshi EX for violating 20 different state gaming laws.
- **3/19:** AG Mayes hired an expert consultant as her office challenges TEP and APS rate increases; the expert stated Arizonans are paying way too much and proposed slashing their 14% for-profit rate to 4%.
- **3/19:** Senator Gallego urged federal regulators to monitor Arizona's fuel supply and prepare emergency contingency plans, noting Arizona's price increases are much higher than the national average, making them increasingly unaffordable.
- **3/20:** Federal Court of Appeals dismissed a lawsuit regarding Arizona voter registration noting there is no proof ineligible people are on the rolls and therefore there is no legal basis to file suit in the first place.
- **3/20:** Federal judge reversed Kari Lake's unlawful orders that forced VOA to go dark, giving the government until March 23 to bring the 1,042 journalists back to their jobs.
- **3/22:** Representative Adelita Grijalva on behalf of Fuentes Ponce who requires dialysis submitted an urgent inquiry to ICE to share their corrective actions since his emergency hospitalization.
- **3/29:** Governor Hobbs vetoed legislation to rename a freeway section Maricopa County after Charlie Kirk, pointing out that only the Arizona State Board on Geographic and Historic Names can do so.
- **3/29:** State fire officials unveiled a new network of wildfire-spotting cameras in areas like Mohave County that are outside the Park Service's jurisdiction in preparation for a particularly bad fire year.

- **3/29:** AZ Costco plans to build on tribal land near Indian School and Pima roads, hire 250 full-time workers, give preference to tribal members, and pay a one-time lump sum in rent to the tribe.
- **3/30:** National No Kings³ organizers said 3,200 events were registered in all 50 states and several other countries with an estimated 8 million people participating; 79 rallies were planned across Arizona.
- **3/31:** Supreme Court upheld the State Court of Appeals ruling that Mohave County Supervisor Gould had no standing regarding a hand count of votes noting his appeal is illegal and may result in criminal penalties.
- **4/3:** Federal appeals court rejected Republican lawmakers bid to overturn Biden's designation of the Navajo Ancestral Footprints Grand Canyon National Monument for lack legal standing which belongs to AG Mayes.
- **4/4:** Governor Hobbs' energy task force delivered its final report of 31 recommendations to meet the demands of data centers and Arizona's semiconductor boom without driving up utility bills.

From Run for Something by Amanda Litman

- **3/9:** Nine of our candidates won their primaries outright and four more are heading into run-offs — plus another 9 were in uncontested primaries and are moving right along to the general with the wind at their backs.
- **3/16:** Last week we announced a new class of 62 endorsed candidates across 28 states.
- **3/16:** We've endorsed 200 candidates across 37 states in 2026: 34% for municipal office, 46% for state legislature seats, 9% for education and 4% for legal roles.
- **3/16:** Democrats have flipped 28 seats in state legislatures over the last 14 months. Republicans have not flipped a single one.
- **3/16:** This is the work that builds long-term power. Every dollar goes directly toward recruiting and supporting even more great young leaders who will make a difference now & for years to come.
- **3/23:** We are winning big, even when they're outspent 10 to 1. Six RFS candidates won their contested primaries in Illinois last week.
- **3/23:** Meanwhile, Emily Gregory is on the ballot tomorrow for a special election in Trump's home House district FL-87, a race has gone fully national. She has outraised her opponent; Democrats have returned more mail ballots than Republicans and the Florida Democratic Party is all-in.
- **3/30:** Emily Gregory WON the special election for Florida House District 87 — flipping a seat in the district that includes Mar-a-Lago. She's a first-time candidate, a military spouse, and a leader with public health background. She beat the Trump-endorsed Republican in a district Trump won in 2024. HUGE.
- **3/30:** This is the **44th** red-to-blue flip for Run for Something in the last 14 months. We're building long-term power in deep red places all over the country.
- **3/30:** We're keeping up the momentum to bring in new leadership. Our National Run for Office Day was another big milestone for this effort. Thanks for celebrating with us!
