Guest Speakers: **Gabriella Carazes-Kelly & Kristin Downing**



Gabriella Cázares-Kelly, Pima County Recorder

Gabriella was elected Pima County Recorder in November 2020 and began her administration in January 2021. She leads an office that oversees voter registration, early voting and document recording for Pima County.

She was inspired to run for office after encountering many systemic barriers preventing people from simply registering to vote. She is the first Native American to hold an elected Pima County office and the third Native American to hold a county-level office in the State of Arizona.

She is a proud product of Pima Community College, holds a bachelor’s degree from the University of Arizona and a master’s degree in educational leadership from Northern Arizona University.

She is a former public school educator and community organizer. She is one of four women who co-founded Indivisible Tohono, a grassroots community organization that provides education and civic-engagement opportunities for members of her tribe, the Tohono O’odham Nation.



Kristin Downing, Advocate

Kristin Downing has been an advocate at the state and local levels for the past five years. She served as the Political Action Chair for the Arizona PACE Committee with the Human Rights Campaign.

She recently graduated from ASU with her degree in Community Advocacy and Social Policy and is one of the founding organizers of Pima Resists ICE, a coalition that has been working since October to stop the planned ICE detention center from opening in Marana.

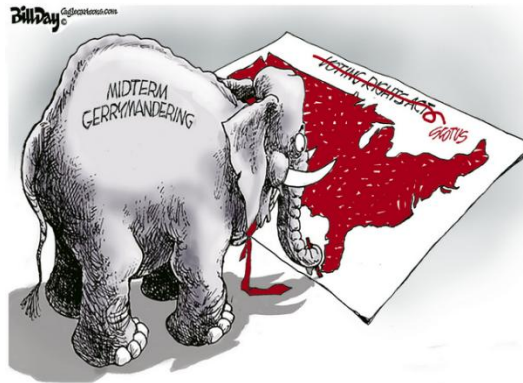

Arizona Prop 106, the Supreme Court and Beyond by *Dee Maitland*

In 2000 Arizona Voters passed Proposition 106 by a 12-point margin. It amended our constitution to establish the Independent Redistrict Commission (IRC). It was considered exemplary at the time for removing legislative gerrymandering. The IRC has now established our voting districts three times: 2000, 2010 and 2020. The first 2 redistricting sessions resulted in multiple lawsuits, including one led by our own despicable Vince Leach. It went all the way to the Supreme Court where he lost.

Beginning in 2019 I was part of a League of Women Voters committee which followed the 2020 redistricting process. From the beginning we could see how the IRC could be hijacked by a political party. The roster of candidates for commission appointments is handled by the Commission on Appellate Court Appointments (CACA). By then Governor Ducey had packed CACA with 16 political cronies; violating the rules. The LWV wrote a letter to him, and he managed to add one inexperienced Democrat at the last minute. The result was an approved list of Republicans who were all politically connected and wealthy and a list of less powerful Democrats who were working individuals and academics, and a list of “Independents” who ran fund raisers for Trump and financed Ducey’s campaigns. The outcome was an “impartial” chair who strongly favored Republicans. Of the 9 culminating votes on district maps, 2 were unanimous votes; one was 3/2 in favor of the Democrats; and five were 3/2 in favor of Republican positions, including the final maps. The result was our LD17 district meeting only the population requirement of Prop 106, and a gerrymandered CD6 which resulted in Ciscomani’s election in liberal Pima County.

I give you this background because of the recent Supreme Court ruling on the Voting Rights Act (VRA). Prop 106 required compliance with the VRA as one of the 6 criteria the IRC must consider in designing districts. Per the 2020 census our state was only 52.9% white. The remaining populations fell under the VRA. Now Senate President Republican Warren Pedersen wants to call the IRC back in session to redistrict for the Supreme Court ruling. There is no provision in our constitution for mid-term recall of the IRC except for addressing lawsuits, which is one route Mr. Pedersen is exploring.

After the 2020 IRC process was over, the Arizona Democratic Party established the freestanding Census and Redistricting Committee. We have been actively interviewing the leaders who established the IRC and past IRC members and commissioners to determine the best practices for independent redistricting with a goal towards removing the political influence we witnessed in 2020 and truly ending up with maps that are competitive and fair to all voters.

Currently Republican J.D. Mesnard has proposed SCR1023 that would expand the IRC, add equal numbers of Republicans, Democrats and Independents, along with some provisions for increasing the influence of the

state's largest counties. Should it make it out of committee here are a few amendments we would propose to our legislators:

- Reduce the power of the chair by adding a provision for consensus voting; every vote would have to include at least one from each representative party.
- Remove CACA from the initial selection process. Many other IRCs use outside firms for vetting and categorizing, followed by a process comparable to the way juries are selected.
- Compensation for commissioners would allow the pool to include candidates who cannot afford to take a year off work.
- Clearly rank the mapping criteria with an emphasis on competitive districts which would encourage moderate candidates and greater citizen participation.

That is where you come in. As you have witnessed, getting a citizen proposition on the ballot is very difficult and Republicans continue to find ways to make it harder. The best chance for any changes to the IRC is a legislative referral to voters like Mesnard's proposal.

The next census is less than 4 years away and Republicans are proposing ways to sabotage the outcome. We must be in position to keep the process legitimate and the IRC free from political influence. We must ensure our excellent candidates sweep all offices and that they understand the importance of the 2030 IRC.

Ten Steps to Freedom and Power *by Stacey Abrams*

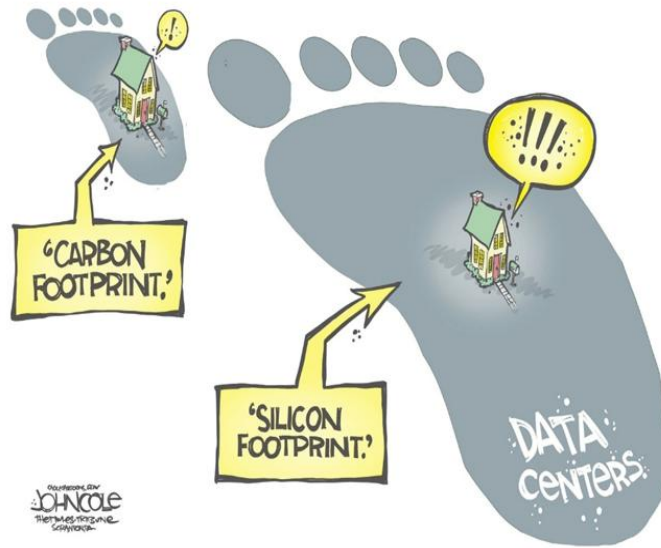
Defeating authoritarianism isn't a cinematic moment. - it's thousands of individuals, community and institutional actions that are stronger and more consistent than those who would oppress us. You don't need to be an expert. You don't need permission. You just need to start. Start where you are. With what you have. Among those you know.

Together, we can build something stronger than fear. We can build a better democracy. We can build freedom. We can build power.

1. **Commit** – Understand what's happening, not simply in the headlines but the effects of policies on you and your community. Our strength lies in our numbers. Join in.
2. **Share** – Stay informed and share the facts on social media, in group chats, and in your circles, not just why you care but how you're taking action. Remember, others feel this way too.
3. **Organize** – Create a group of friends, family and allies who want to work towards a common goal. Pick your issue. That's it. That's organizing.
4. **Mobilize** – Once you've organized, do something. Share banned books. Help immigrants. Support your local library. Join a tenants' union. Host public events and regular conversations. It's not about size but movement.
5. **Litigate** – You don't have to be an attorney to be part of litigation. If you or someone you know has been harmed, be a plaintiff or a witness. If you are in the legal field, volunteer to help vulnerable populations.
6. **Disrupt** – Don't be part of their system of disinformation and compliance. Protest. Then do more. Like film violations of civil rights or hand out "Know Your Rights" cards in occupied cities. Block propaganda and call it out.
7. **Deny** – Refuse to be complicit in how authoritarians strip us of our language, engagement and connections. Create community, practice non-violent civil disobedience and boycott groups that are hurting us.
8. **Engage** – Work with your elected officials to introduce policies and proactive legislation, especially at the state and local levels. Do it yourself if the rules allow it – start ballot initiatives, public petitions and more.
9. **Elect** – Federal elections are crucial, but we cannot forget that harm can come at every level of government. So can change – we must give people something to believe in again. Participate in your local elections for city council, county commission, state legislature, judicial – every single one.
10. **Demand** – It's not enough to just reclaim what we had. We must demand more and build a better government. Be clear about what we deserve – from our allies and from those who would destroy democracy. Don't meekly ask for what we think we can get. Declare what kind of country we intend to build. Then get to work.

Data centers are too costly for Arizona

Data centers have a significant environmental impact characterized by massive electricity consumption that is projected to reach up to 12% of US demand by 2028 and extremely heavy water usage for cooling that uses over 1 billion gallons per facility annually.

Data centers exacerbate climate change through greenhouse gas emissions and create localized “heat islands” that can increase land temperatures by 16 degrees Fahrenheit. Backup generators emit harmful pollutants and particulate matter that impact air quality in surrounding communities. And the rapid turnover of servers and IT equipment contributes to significant E-Waste.

No amount of temporary job creation can offset these devastating effects.

- **4/5:** The Stanley Family Foundation contributed another \$280 million for research and treatment for bipolar and schizophrenia bringing its total to over \$1 billion.
- **4/5:** 19 countries around the world and the tech industry have banned social media for children; in the US, Children's Online Privacy Protection Act prevents companies from collecting data of children under 13.
- **4/6:** Portland, Oregon soccer tournament for immigrant and refugee girls, organized by an immigrant from Bhutan and US citizen countered their fears of ICE with cheers of joy.
- **4/7:** The skyrocketing power demands of data centers and rising electric bills spurred an increased interest in those running for the Salt River Project governing board, tripling requests for early ballots.
- **4/9:** A free cataract surgery marathon by South Africa's public health service last month restored the sight of 133 people who had been waiting for years for treatment.
- **4/9:** US health insurers pared back some prior-approval requirements for certain types of treatment; about 11% were removed, equaling 6.5 million fewer prior-approval requests for Medicare and other plans.
- **4/10:** Trump's Iran threats emboldened dozens of Democrats to demand he be removed from office either through the impeachment process or the 25th Amendment.
- **4/10:** GOP election setbacks in Wisconsin and a near loss in Georgia along with consistent swings from red to blue have contributed to a clear picture of Democratic momentum leading up to the midterms.
- **4/11:** Trump's most influential critic in the country, America's first Pope Leo XIV declared Trump's belligerence in the war with Iran as "truly unacceptable."
- **4/11:** Pro-Iran groups are using AI created memes in English to shape the narrative against the US and Israel and fostering opposition to it with well-honed cartoons lambasting US officials.
- **4/11:** Liberty Mutual Foundation launched a \$600 million endowment to non-profits that focus on housing stability, workforce development and climate change with an offer of more than 500 high-impact grants.
- **4/12:** Pope Leo celebrated his first Easter Mass as pontiff with a call to lay down arms and seek peace through dialogue, having previously chastised Trump's threat to destroy Iran civilization.
- **4/12:** Federal judge refused to block filling prescriptions for the abortion pill by mail across the country.
- **4/13:** Maui Rapid Response nonprofit launched a Kahua Card program to help fire victims with cash assistance; they have sent 18 households up to \$1,100 per month depending on family size.
- **4/14:** Newly elected Hungarian prime minister Magyar who backs an end to the Ukraine war is likely to lift Hungary's veto and enable the European Commission to provide Ukraine with a \$105 billion loan.
- **4/14:** Center for Small Town Jewish Life in Maine has been serving and assisting rural synagogues in more than 60 communities in 22 states nationwide.
- **4/16:** Representatives Eric Swalwell and Tony Gonzales accused of sexual misconduct resigned rather than face the prospect of being expelled by their colleagues; house members are calling for a wider reckoning.
- **4/16:** After years of #MeToo infamy, legal peril and prison, Harvey Weinstein is again going to trial on a rape charge in New York City.
- **4/17:** Boston researchers discovered a blood test that can detect the earliest signals of Alzheimer's disease years before symptoms appear or brain scans change.

- **4/17:** ICE detentions fell to their lowest numbers since last fall when there were only 46 court-ordered releases; by March there were 1,005 court-ordered releases. According to a director of immigration studies, ICE doesn't have the resources to defend what they're doing and keep locking people up.
- **4/17:** Scientists are combating climate change with DNA by using conservation genomics to pinpoint traits suited to survive drought, disease and other climate extremes that can guide restoration.
- **4/18:** Democrats are reporting large fundraising gains in some of this year's top Senate contests in their quest to win the Senate majority, a potential sign of voter enthusiasm.
- **4/18:** Google released its annual Ad Safety report showing its generative AI technology caught 99% of policy-violating ads before they reached an audience last year, blocking or removing 8.3 million ads.
- **4/19:** Federal judge again ruled Trump's plan to build a \$400 million White House ballroom without congressional approval is unlawful and faulted him for demanding the project move forward.
- **4/19:** Congressmen accused of sexual abuse spurred a group of bipartisan congresswomen to call for reforms and hold men accountable for abusing their power and besmirching their public office.
- **4/19:** New Gallup poll found that more American workers are skeptical of AI, citing ethical oppositions, data privacy, and other negative impacts, including job security.
- **4/20:** As they pray for their relative's safety and mourn those already lost, the largest Arab American community in the nation is turning away from Trump and will not support him or Republicans in the future.
- **4/21:** A volunteer unit has grown into a 40,000-strong corps using US Army planning methods and adapting them over time has made it one of Ukraine's most effective fighting forces.
- **4/21:** More than 60 EU nations sent representatives to meet with Palestinian officials stability, security and long-term peace; a majority of EU countries now recognize an independent Palestinian state.
- **4/22:** Minnesota launched 17 investigations into the actions of several ICE agents during the Twin Cities immigration crackdown; charges have been filed in multiple cases already.
- **4/23:** Former Fox host Tucker Carlson expressed his regrets for helping elect Trump in 2024 and misleading people, telling his listeners: "you and me and millions of people like us are the reason this happening."
- **4/24:** Consumer Federation of America filed a class action lawsuit requesting a jury trial seeking damages for consumers against Meta for running ads for high-risk scams and banned goods.
- **4/24:** In a recent Reuters poll 64% of American question Trump's temperament and mental acuity amid the Iran war and oppose his feud with Pope Leo, including some members of his Republican party.
- **4/25:** A recent Reuters poll found 52% of Americans are less likely to support a candidate who backs Trump's ICE deportation policies which could cost GOP in the midterms.
- **4/26:** US Court of Appeals for DC blocked Trump' executive order suspending asylum access, finding immigration laws give people the right to apply for asylum at the southern border.
- **4/28:** Reuters latest poll found 77% of registered voters across the political spectrum blame Trump for surging gas prices: 55% Republican, 82% independents, 95% Democrat. 58%, including one in five Republicans and two-thirds of independents are less likely to support candidates who support Trump.
- **4/30:** New Gallup poll found 55% Americans say they're worse off today than 25 years ago, citing the high cost of living, lack of affordable housing and surging energy costs and gas prices.
- **5/1:** CEO sisters of Cakes Body went viral for providing free childcare to their employees with up to \$3,000 monthly stipends and noting childcare for two children is more expensive than rent in all 50 states.
- **5/3:** Ukraine air force data showed an interception rate of long-range drones at 85% last month; with Russia's land campaign slowing to a crawl, the force hopes to reach an interception goal of 95%.

- **5/4:** Lawsuit by the National Trust for Historic Preservation regarding Trump's ballroom remains ongoing; the arch is facing legal battles as well; 56% of people polled do not support either project.
- **5/5:** Supreme Court temporarily reinstated mail-order access to the abortion drug mifepristone while they consider the issue.
- **5/6:** Arizona federal judge dismissed a DOJ lawsuit that demanded the state's voter rolls that include partial Social Security numbers, making Arizona the sixth state to defeat the DOJ so far this year.
- **5/6:** Trump's disapproval rating hit a record high; 76% disapprove of his handling of cost of living, 72% disapprove of his handling of inflation; among registered voters Democrats are favored in House elections by five points.

- **4/9:** Governor Hobbs vetoed a bill that would place onerous burdens on schools and colleges by requiring they provide information about adoption when discussing contraception and sexually transmitted diseases.
- **4/9:** Pima County supervisors passed a resolution opposing any federal involvement in local elections that would restrict mail-in voting.
- **4/10:** UA honored 10 student volunteers with the "Wildcat Heroes Award" for their extraordinary determination, selflessness, and courage in their humanitarian aid and community service.
- **4/10:** Representative Grijalva said Trump is unfit to be the commander in chief for threatening genocide of civilians as leverage in the Iran war, calling his actions illegal and evil; Ciscomani declined to comment.
- **4/13:** Tucson Department of Transportation is addressing bike lane safety by adding precast concrete curbs, flexible bollards and posts; Tucson currently ranks as the 5th most dangerous city for cyclists in the US.
- **4/13:** Senator Gallego withdrew his endorsement of California gubernatorial candidate Eric Swalwell who is facing allegations of sexually assaulting a former staffer; Senator Schiff withdrew his endorsement as well.
- **4/14:** Senator Kelly urged the nation to return to programs that ensure diversity, noting the best option in any organization is to have different backgrounds, experiences and approaches to achieve better outcomes.
- **4/14:** Governor Hobbs announced she will veto any legislation Republicans send her until they deliver a budget proposal, noting she released her proposal for a \$17.8 billion spending plan in January.
- **4/14:** Governor Hobbs vetoed dozens of bills aimed at what she called the GOP working to strip health care and food assistance from children and a bill making superintendents' pay and retirement public.
- **4/17:** AG Mayes used state consumer fraud laws to force Arizona's largest electric utility to stop disconnecting customers for nonpayment when temperatures hit 95 degrees or higher.
- **4/17:** Pima Community College celebrated its newly expanded Building and Construction Technology Center to train students in carpentry, electrical, HVAC, plumbing and construction management.
- **4/19:** Tohono O'odham leaders are looking at legal options to fight CBP's border plans to build two 30-foot walls on the southern boundary of the Nation further separating their 3,000 members who live in Sonora.
- **4/19:** Bureau of Reclamation will release extra water into Lake Powell and slash releases to Lake Mead to prevent water levels dropping so low Glen Canyon Dam could no longer generate electric power.
- **4/19:** Over 22,000 people signed an online "Anna's Law" petition that would impose stricter penalties for street racing that cost 3-year-old Anna Garcia her life.
- **4/19:** State lawmakers Alma Henandez and Consuelo Hernandez will remain on the Democratic primary ballot after legal challenges were rejected since the AG's office never issued a notice of penalty.
- **4/22:** UA and NAU nursing students are working to prevent heat-related illnesses and deaths by going into low-income, high-risk areas to survey their needs, educate them and provide other outreach.

- **4/22:** US Geological Survey of River Drought is using AI to foretell flow rates of rivers nationwide; 37 of the 45 monitored Arizona locations are experiencing moderate-to-extreme draught.
- **4/22:** A non-profit that trains service dogs for disabled veterans opened a new training facility in Tucson to pair vets with PTSD and traumatic brain injuries with a service dog and companion.
- **4/23:** Southwest Autism Research and Resource Center is opening a new campus in Tucson that will focus on early diagnosis, intensive early intervention, and inclusive education; a 6-week parent program will be offered as well.
- **4/24:** Tucson City Council lowered speed limits on 20 streets across Tucson as part of a wider traffic safety effort.
- **4/24:** Opponents of the Oak Flat mine project filed an amended lawsuit to block the mine from destroying sacred Indigenous land, alleging the government acknowledged there were available sources.
- **4/25:** Free speech advocates of the Foundation for Individual Rights and libertarian Cato Institute backed Senator Kelly regarding the government’s punitive efforts against him for his “illegal orders” video.
- **4/26:** UA’s program to have AI intersect with healthcare research is developing “smart bandages” that can detect infection in post-surgical and diabetes patients.
- **4/26:** San Clemente is joining other Tucson neighborhoods in officially removing race-based “for Whites or Caucasians” restrictions that are still found in their founding documents despite the 1968 Fair Housing Act.
- **4/26:** Tucson City Manager recommended Tucson’s transit remain free of charge to avoid the costs of updating and maintaining a new system.
- **4/26:** AG Mayes filed a lawsuit against the federal government to block a warehouse in Surprise from being converted to a detention center for up to 1,500 immigrants as inappropriate, illegal and hazardous.
- **4/29:** Governor Hobbs and Mayor Romero support the STAR Village safe sleeping site that has served 82 people and reduced crime by 35% which will be extended for another year if the Council passes the 2027 budget.
- **4/30:** Federal judge ruled Trump is not entitled to Arizona’s voter registration records, adding to the five other jurisdictions that found Trump lacks the authority to demand such documents.
- **4/30:** Residents and businesses in the small town of Kearny collectively reduced municipal water consumption by 30%, stretching their resources until September when two more wells could be opened.
- **5/2:** Affordable housing complex Amazon Flats with 59 one-bedroom apartments on Tucson’s west side will serve households earning up to 59% of the Area Median Income, joining a 30-unit building already on the site.
- **5/2:** Senator Kelly as a member of the Armed Services Committee criticized Pentagon chief Hegseth for burning through pricey munitions in Iran with no real goal and threatening to kill those who surrender.
- **5/3:** Arizona, California and Nevada announced a proposal to stabilize the Colorado River by saving at least 3.2 million acre-feet of water through 2028 which would be enough water to serve Tucson for 32 years.
- **5/3:** Interfaith Community Services has moved beyond providing food and financial assistance with their Mom Scholars Program that provides training for women, helps them get hired and moves them out of poverty.
- **5/4:** Senator Gallego and Representative Bacon called for more aid to Ukraine to ensure it has the resources to win against a weakened Russia.
- **5/6:** US Interior Department and the Office of Management and Budget approved spending \$450 million to carry out additional Colorado River water conservation programs in Arizona, Nevada and California.
